Applicants for PEC Assessment of Phthalates

Diisodecyl phthalate (DIDP) was declared as a Priority Existing Chemical (PEC) by the Minister for Health and Ageing on 7 March 2006 for the following specific consumer applications:

- Children's toys;
- Childcare articles; and
- Cosmetics

In accordance with the *Industrial Chemicals (Notification and Assessment) Act 1989*, as amended, all those who wish to manufacture or import DIDP as a **raw material** for use in toys, childcare products or cosmetics, or import **cosmetic products** containing DIDP during the period that it is a PEC must apply in writing using the PEC Application Form. Persons other than importers or manufacturers may also apply. There are no application fees, however, there is a penalty for manufacturing or importing a PEC without applying for assessment of the chemical.

NICNAS is also making voluntary calls for information on the use of DIDP in finished products, to supplement information on DIDP as a raw material. Importers/manufacturers of children's toys or childcare articles and manufacturers of cosmetics are encouraged to submit information about products containing DIDP.
